


Baptism Steps at Cornerstone

I. What is baptism?



- Baptism: "The event of being dipped into water temporarily as a cleansing, ceremonial, and initiatory rite." - Logos
- βαπτίζω (baptizō) = "to cover or plunge in water, wash, dip, immerse" - Rose Publishing

"Baptism is often described as *an outward sign of an inward change*. It is a public testimony that you believe in Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior. Your baptism powerfully proclaims what God has done and is doing, in your life. In addition, as a follower of Jesus, you are publicly saying that you join with Christians from around the world who are unified by faith in Jesus' death and resurrection."

Outward Symbol

- Baptism is an outward symbol. What is the outward symbol? It's death, burial, and resurrection with Christ.
 - 1. **Immersion** (going down into water). Believers are identified with Christ's **death** and the death of their old sinful nature.




 Water = Symbol of death, chaos, and judgment, but also of cleansing and purity.

 - 2. **Submersion** (being completely under the water). Believers are identified with Christ's **burial**.

Outward Symbol

- Baptism is an outward symbol. What is the outward symbol? It's death, burial, and resurrection with Christ.
 - 3. **Emersion** (coming up out of the water). Believers are identified with Christ's **resurrection** from the dead to newness of life.




Can you raise yourself from the dead? God raises you.
 You're saved by God's grace.

Where does the Bible teach this?

- Romans 6:3-4 Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. (NIV)
- Colossians 2:12 having been buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through your faith in the working of God, who raised him from the dead. (NIV)


Inward Change

- Baptism is an outward symbol of an inward change. What is the inward change?
- Ezekiel 36:26 I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. (NIV)
 - Receiving a new heart!




Inward Change

- 1 Corinthians 12:13 For we were all <u>baptized by one</u>
 Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were <u>all given the one Spirit</u> to drink. (NIV)
 - Outward baptism symbolizes inward baptism by the Holy Spirit (wash sins away/give faith).



Inward Change

- "[Baptism] signifies that the believer has been spiritually plunged into Jesus Christ by the Spirit."
 - Baptism by Larry E. Dyer
- Romans 6:3 Or don't you know that all of us who were <u>baptized into Christ Jesus</u> were baptized into his death? (NIV)



Outward Symbol of Inward Change

- 1 Peter 3:21 and this water symbolizes baptism that now saves you also—not the removal of dirt from the body but the pledge of a clear conscience toward God. It saves you by the resurrection of Jesus Christ, (NIV)
- Baptism is an outward symbol of an inward change:
 - Your spiritual death, burial, and resurrection with Jesus Christ, your union with him;
 - Because the Holy Spirit has given you a new heart.

II. Why do we baptize?

Why do we Baptize?

- Jesus gave the church two ordinances, or commands for us to obey...
 - Communion The Last Supper




• Matthew 28:19-20 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (NIV)

Why do we Baptize?

- In Baptism, God:
 - Marks us as his own (sign & seal)
 - Romans 4:11a And [Abraham] received circumcision as a sign, a seal of the righteousness that he had by faith while he was still uncircumcised. (NIV)







 Seal - God's stamp of ownership on us.

Why do we Baptize?

- In Baptism, we:
 - Affiliate with Christ's New Covenant community, the Church (aka. the people of God).
 - Publicly profess faith in Christ alone

Old Covenant Community

- Covenant: A promise where God is involved.
- The Old Covenant (Sinai) consists of believing and non-believing Israelites and those who converted to Judaism.
 - · Males marked by circumcision as their sign.



- But... God's true people were always those who believe.
 - 1 Kings 18:18 Yet I reserve seven thousand in Israel--all whose knees have not bowed down to Baal and whose mouths have not kissed him." (NIV)

God Promised a New Covenant

Jeremiah 31:31-32a

"The days are coming," declares the Lord, "when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah.

It will not be like the covenant
I made with their ancestors
when I took them by the hand
to lead them out of Egypt,
because they broke my covenant... (NIV)

Jesus Made the New Covenant

Luke 22:20

In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the **new covenant** in my blood, which is poured out for you. (NIV) (c.f., Hebrews 8:7-8)

This new covenant is actually similar to an old covenant, but not the one at Sinai... the one with **Abram/Abraham**.

Old/New Covenant with Abraham

Genesis 15 (NIV)

6 Abram believed the Lord, and he credited it to him as righteousness. . . .

9 So the Lord said to him, "Bring me a heifer, a goat and a ram, each three years old, along with a dove and a young pigeon."

10 Abram brought all these to him, cut them in two and arranged the halves opposite each other; the birds, however, he did not cut in half. 11 Then birds of prey came down on the carcasses, but Abram drove them away.

Old/New Covenant with Abraham

Genesis 15 (NIV)

12 As the sun was setting, Abram fell into a deep sleep, and a thick and dreadful darkness came over him. . . .

17 When the sun had set and darkness had fallen, a smoking firepot with a blazing torch appeared and passed between the pieces.

The covenant was not dependent on Abraham's obedience, but on God's promise.

Jesus Made the New Covenant

We enter into this new covenant through faith.

Romans 10:9-10

If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved. (NIV)

New Covenant Community

- The New Covenant (Church) consists of those who know Christ. (Matt 7:21-23)
 - All believers are marked by baptism as their initial sign and communion as their continual/ongoing sign.







- · We are baptized into the people of God, the Church.
- Acts 2:41 Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand were added to their number that day. (NIV)


Colossians 2:11-12

- 11 In him you were also circumcised with a circumcision not performed by human hands. Your whole self ruled by the flesh was put off when you were circumcised by Christ, 12 having been buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through your faith in the working of God, who raised him from the dead. (NIV)
- Baptism is the new circumcision, but it is only for those who have faith.



Baptism & the Local Church

- 1 Corinthians 12:12-13 For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ.
 For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body
 —Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit. (NIV)
- We are baptized into the people of God, specifically, into a local church body, which symbolizes our union with the universal church body.



The Church Matters!

- Hebrews 10:24-25 And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds,
 25 not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching. (NIV)
- God wants us to regularly gather with other believers as the intentional church community.
- Baptism is a kind of initiation rite into this community.
 Communion is an ongoing rite.

Baptism gives us a new identity

Galatians 3:26-29 So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, 27 for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. 28 There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. 29 If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise. (NIV) (c.f., Rom 8:15-17; Gal 4:1-6)

The Church & Identity

Christians "have a new identity because they have been baptized into Christ and adopted as his sisters and brothers. . . . The biological family, let alone the nation-state, is no longer the primary source of identity, support and growth."




Does Baptism Grant Salvation?

- Mark 16:16 Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned. (NIV)
 - It does not say, "whoever is not baptized will be condemned..."
 - Emphasis is on faith!
 - We are saved by grace, not works (Eph 2:8-9)



A Moment of Self Critique

- Crossing the sin-gap on a Jesus-cross is helpful but not necessarily the image Jesus gives us.
- In Genesis 28, Jacob has a dream where he sees a ladder to heaven, but he doesn't climb it.
- Jesus identifies himself and his work as that ladder between heaven and earth.
- John 1:51 He then added, "Very truly I tell you, you will see 'heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending on' the Son of Man." (NIV)

A Moment of Self Critique

Jesus likens himself, and his ministry, to a bridge between heaven and earth much like Jacob's ladder—not a bridge we climb or cross over but something connecting, or linking, heaven and earth, God and humankind. Jesus is how we come to God, not just how we cross the sin-gap to get over to God. Jesus stands between us and God at all times, making the Father known to us and interceding for our sins. This is why "asking Jesus into my heart" is such a slippery concept—using Jesus as a bridge to cross over is a much different proposition from actually being connected to or in Christ.

Who can be baptized?

- At Cornerstone, we practice believer's baptism (credobaptism).
 - Articles of Faith: V. 12. We believe in observing the ordinances of the Lord's Supper (communion) and baptism. Our church practices baptism after confession of faith.
 - · "Credo" comes from "creed" (belief before baptism)
 - Baptism after confession of faith (aka. upon, as...)

What We Believe

- Who holds this view? Baptists, Non-Denominational Churches, and some Congregationalists
- Where do we see baptism for those who repent and believe in the Bible? Pattern in the early church.
- Acts 2:38 Peter replied, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. (NIV) (see also Matthew 3:6)

Where else does the Bible teach this?

- Acts 8:12 But when they believed Philip as he proclaimed the good news of the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. (NIV) (c.f., Acts 10:44-48)
- Acts 8:35–36, 38 Then Philip began with that very passage of Scripture and told him the good news about Jesus. As they traveled along the road, they came to some water and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water. What can stand in the way of my being baptized?" And he gave orders to stop the chariot. Then both Philip and the eunuch went down into the water and Philip baptized him. (NIV)

What Others Believe: Infant Baptism

- Many churches practice infant baptism (i.e., paedobaptism).
 - "Pais" means "child" (at least one believing parent)
 - Lutherans, Anglicans, Reformed, and Congregationalists
- Biblically based in God's promise to Abraham and his children (Gen 17:7-8) and NT examples of household baptisms (Acts 16:13-15; 32-34; 1 Cor 1:16).

Acts 2:38a-39 "Repent and be baptized...The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the Lord our God will call." (NIV)

Response to Infant Baptism

- We respect the Biblical reasons many faithful churches and strong believers give for infant-baptism.
 - But... Just like Abraham was circumcised yesterday as a sign of his faith, we are baptized today as a sign of our faith (Gen 15:6; Rom 2:29; 4:9-11; Gal 3:26-27; Col 2:11-12; 1 Pet 3:21).
 - We see continuities between the Old and New Covenant signs (people of God), but also discontinuities (only for believers).

What Others Believe: Catholic Baptism

- The Catholic church practices infant baptism.
 - Initial sacrament that conveys saving grace
 - Accomplishes "remission of sin, both original and actual only original sin in the case of infants and young children, since they are incapable of actual sin; and both original and actual sin in the case of older persons" <u>catholic.com</u>






- You can still lose salvation by unforgiven mortal sins
- Catholics view re-baptism as a sin against the Holy Spirit (<u>catholic.com</u>).

Response to Catholic Baptism

- We respect the Catholic Church but disagree that any ritual can convey saving grace.
 - Ephesians 2:8-9 For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast. (NIV)
 - We are all forgiven, child or adult, by God's grace, not by anything we do.

IV. How can I be baptized?

Step 1 - Repent: Turn from sin to God.

Mark 1:15 "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!" (NIV)



Acts 3:19 Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord, (NIV)

Step 2 - Believe: Believe the good news about Jesus.

Mark 1:15 "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!" (NIV)



John 3:16 For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. (NIV)



How Can I Be Baptized?

- · Please fill out our baptism application. We ask for:
 - 1. A demonstrated commitment to Christ prior to your baptism.
 - 2. Write and submit your Faith Story.
 - 3. Meet with a **Pastor** or **Elder** to discuss.
 - 4. Commit to **faithfully attending** and serving a **Christ-centered church** going forward.
